Our Story

Anglican Deaconess Ministries is a Christian women's organisation that encourages and equips women to serve Christ and his Church. Founded in 1891, ADM continues this legacy through our programs to support women serving the Lord in the Church, the community and the world.





ADM began 130 years ago when an Anglican Minister and his wife, Rev. Mervyn and Martha Archdall, set aside a quarter of his stipend for the equipping of Christian women. The Archdalls set up a lay order, the "deaconesses", modelled on a similar order in Germany, and in 1891 ADM was born.


Through prayer and partnership, sacrificial serving and giving, our work grew from small beginnings over many years to include hospitals, nursing homes and schools. Always at the centre has been a foundation built on Jesus Christ and serving him.

As our society has changed over the years, so has the shape of ADM's work. ADM continues our legacy through a diverse range of innovative programs and events for Christian women, to see them equipped and encouraged for gospel work. This includes Mary Andrews College (MAC), the Mental Health and Pastoral Care Institute, Mercy and Justice programs, an Annual Public Lecture, Fellowships and a range of programs and funding for Christian women.

ADM is proudly a member organisation, with members drawn from a diverse range of settings and interests. All of our members share a common desire to see women equipped and encouraged to serve Christ and his Church.

As a Christian organisation, our highest priority is to see people come to know Christ and grow in him. NCLS Research tells us that 60% of the Australian church is female. At ADM, we work to see every Christian woman using their gifts so that God's kingdom would grow across Australia and the world. We are committed to seeing women flourish in Christ, being built up as they serve the Lord, and provided with the resources they need to reach the world for Jesus.




Our convictional foundations

New CEO Rev. Jo Gibbs reflects on the biblical convictions that shape ADM as an organisation.

Throughout ADM's history we have demonstrated the relationship between the good news and compassionate work, as we share Christ's message and his love with the world. In doing so, we reveal the fruit of the gospel in our own lives and respond to the love shown to us in Christ.

Knowing the urgency of the gospel, we work with the local church to see every woman equipped and fully activated in Christ's service, as God's image bearers and valued contributors to the growth of his kingdom. We strive to see every woman flourishing in union with Christ as they remain in him. We long to see women grow deeper in maturity in Christ through fellowship around God's Word and prayer. We create pathways for women to serve Christ in the Church, the community and the world, growing their relationship with the Lord as they serve and using their many gifts for the growth of God's kingdom. We celebrate women and men serving Christ together, labouring alongside one another in the world and the Church for the sake of the gospel.

The next five years


ADM Strategic Plan 2022 - 2027

In 2021 ADM began to develop a strategic plan for the next five years. In looking forward, we are building on the wonderful legacy of the deaconesses in equipping women and sending them out across Australia and the world to serve Christ. We are keeping Jesus at the centre of all that we do, and we're asking questions about the big issues facing our communities and how we might share the love of Jesus in practical ways.



The strategic planning process has six key phases:

- **1. Prepare** Designing the process, gathering the planning team and working on theological foundations.
- **2. Listen** Connecting with key stakeholders and those that ADM seeks to serve, ensuring that ADM is providing something distinctive to meet genuine needs.
- **3. Envision** Developing clear vision, mission and values statements.
- **4. Plan** Forming a clear plan for implementing the vision in concrete actions.
- **5. Execute** Sharing strategic priorities and implementing the plan.
- **6. Evaluate** Ensuring that the strategic plan remains relevant and implementation is monitored.



Key to this process is pausing to hear feedback on our existing programs and opening up a conversation about the key challenges facing Christian women and churches. We did this through:

- Stakeholder survey

 a review of existing programs
 and hearing from stakeholders.
- Listening forums

 a series of consultation
 gatherings asking about the
 key challenges facing Christian
 women, envisioning the future
 as we consider God's plans and
 purposes, and brainstorming
 potential solutions.
- Listening survey

 a primarily quantitative, online
 survey hearing the needs of
 Christian women, churches and
 communities.

Supporting women in ministry

Twenty women serving in churches across Sydney and beyond received funding to support their ministries in 2021.



We give thanks to God for the incredible variety of ways in which women, shaped by the gospel of Christ, are faithfully serving him in churches across Sydney and Australia.

In September 2020, ADM launched a new funding scheme focussed on supporting the particular needs of women in ministry across greater Sydney. Grantees in ADM's Women in Ministry Support Scheme (WIMSS) received grants of \$200 to \$2,000 to help pay for theological education, professional development, ministry resources and cover costs after having lost income due to maternity leave.

With the impacts of COVID-19 still being felt, the funding also helped those who had seen their household incomes reduced to purchase the resources they need – including laptops or digital commentaries – to continue to minister in online and offline contexts.

For other grantees, the funding allowed them to support themselves while working on a volunteer or part-time basis or as unpaid student ministers. It also provided a small stipend for those who had taken time off work to undergo full-time theological training.

Amy's Story

Amy Townsend, Membership and Ministry Director at Grace City Church Waterloo and new mum to baby Penny, is the first to receive a small grant to cover lost income due to a period of maternity leave as part of the Women in Ministry Support Scheme (WIMSS).

As there are often no automatically available maternity leave entitlements for ministry staff, ADM saw an opportunity to support women in permanent paid ministry positions to take parental leave before returning to ministry work.

Amy and her husband were thrilled to hear the scheme had a grant category to cover lost income during maternity leave from a continuing paid ministry position. The funding was particularly welcome as the Townsend's had also lost household income due to the lockdowns in Sydney.



Supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women in ministry

Twenty-one Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women received funding to support their ministries this year.

In 2021, ADM supported Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Christian women who serve and minister to their communities out of their Christian faith.

ADM sees that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Christian women continue to be uniquely placed to speak and act with the love of Christ throughout their communities. The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Women in Ministry Support Scheme provided additional support and resourcing for these ministries with grants of \$250 to \$2,500, welcoming applications from across a wide range of areas of ministry, both paid and lay.

ADM celebrates Miriam Numamurdirdi's traineeship



We are delighted to share that Miriam Numamurdirdi has now completed her two-year paid traineeship in partnership with the Northern Territory diocese.

During this traineeship, Miriam has grown significantly in her giftings in chaplaincy and pastoral care, and has ministered to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people through hospital chaplaincy. We give thanks to God for Miriam's faithful service of Christ, and pray God's richest blessings on her future endeavours.

ADM is continuing to partner with the Northern Territory Diocese through a new fund to invest in emerging Aboriginal Christian women leaders, and to support their development in ministry. Having partnered with Miriam throughout her traineeship, Rev. Kate Beer (Ministry Development Officer for the NT Diocese) will also oversee this new initiative, which will equip and resource Aboriginal Christian women in sharing the love of Christ with their communities, and in their leadership development.

Kayleen's Story

Kayleen Manton, a pastor of the Kuku Yalanji people from Cape York, Queensland has led Mt Druitt Indigenous Church, part of Minchinbury Anglican, with her husband for the past twenty-one years.

Across her ministry, she provides culturally appropriate pastoral care to her church, coordinates emergency relief, writes letters on behalf of community members attending court or needing referrals and counsels those grieving lost loved ones or needing care.

Kayleen's WIMSS grant was used to purchase equipment – a laptop and a printer – that will help her conduct both her ministry and her work on the board of Bimbadeen Aboriginal Training College more effectively.

"This funding has given me more space and time to do work on my own timeline. It means I no longer have to wait for my husband to finish his sermon to use his laptop. I will also have the freedom to be flexible, which is really important for my ministry."

Understanding Grief and Loss

Kayleen has been involved with ADM for a number of years, having taken part in workshops and events on understanding Aboriginal peoples' experience of grief and loss.

In 2020, Kayleen attended Jill McGilvray's course on Grief and Loss at Mary Andrews College, following a diagnosis of breast cancer. This year, Kayleen was invited back to share her story.

"The course opened my eyes to grief and loss in a new way," Kayleen said. "It wasn't just theoretical; I was living through it while I was learning about it. It also made me think, as an Aboriginal woman sitting in a class with non-Aboriginal women,



about our different experiences. I think people don't know about our history."

"Kayleen always speaks with wisdom and godliness," Jill says. "She has an extraordinary story that is a privilege to hear. While you'll hear her talk about terrible experiences of generational trauma with family members being part of the stolen generations, she will never give up an opportunity to bring in a godly perspective."

Reflecting on the experience, Kayleen said; "I think it opened people's eyes. I shared my family's story as part of the stolen generations and my experience with breast cancer too."

Responding to COVID-19

COVID-19 Church Response Program

ADM's COVID-19 Church Response Program provided six women with funding for church-based mercy ministries that respond to unique areas of need within their communities through faith in action.

The program invited Christian women attending Anglican churches within the Sydney Diocese to develop compassionled and church-based responses to issues affecting vulnerable, isolated, and disadvantaged peoples in their local communities as a result of COVID-19. Women were able to apply for up to \$5,000 in one-time funding to support these ministries.

As part of the application process, applicants also attended a community transformation workshop in November 2020 which provided support in designing and developing compassionate, biblically-sound, and effective ministries.

Kirsten's Story

In 2020, while Austinmer
Anglican Church undertook
research into the needs
of those in the Northern
Illawarra, four church
members – Kirsten
Hitchens, Liz McCoy,
Wendy Potts and Karen
Charleston – brainstormed
how they could care for
their community through
the pandemic.





Together, they co-founded a food ministry program, For the Love Of (FLO). From the commercial kitchen at Austinmer Anglican Church, the women run regular cooking workshops at no cost, helping participants build connections and create budget-friendly meals. FLO also provides meals to those in the community who are struggling to make ends meet.

In 2021, ADM granted Kirsten Hitchins and the FLO team \$5,000 to continue to offer cooking workshops and meals to the vulnerable as part of the COVID-19 Church Response Program.

"We do the workshops with the idea of helping people connect with each other, which is good for mental health," Kirsten told the Illawarra Mercury "but it's also an educational opportunity

to learn to cook to a budget.
Then participants are asked to
nominate someone from their
street or area who could benefit
from a free meal."

Austinmer Anglican Church pastor Nathan Sandon observed that loneliness, poor mental health and a struggle to meet basic needs (such as putting food on the table), are key issues for the local community. FLO made it their aim to help alleviate some of these challenges.

"Our love for Jesus propels us to show his love and mercy to those in our community," said Kirsten. "This initiative is born out of our response to Christ's love for us and the call to bless those in need. We do this through the love of good, simple and nourishing food."

FLO work with Need A Feed to send meals to people in need. Oz Harvest also supply food for their in-person workshops.

Responding to COVID-19



Katrina's Story

In 2020, Katrina received a \$5,000 grant through ADM's COVID-19 Church Response Program to provide support for vulnerable international students.

Dr Katrina Clifford is the Dean of Academics at Robert Menzies College (RMC), an Anglican residential college affiliated with Macquarie University.

"As a student residential college, we always have a high number of international students living with us," Katrina told ADM. "Over the past year, due to COVID-19, many of these students have struggled financially, with their mental wellbeing and with feelings of isolation as they are unable to return home."

Using her grant, Katrina partnered with Trinity Chapel to help provide practical support to students, with a particular focus on creating community connections and supporting their mental health.

Igraine and Erica's Story

"I PRAISE YOU BECAUSE I AM FEARFULLY AND WONDERFULLY MADE; YOUR WORKS ARE WONDERFUL, I KNOW THAT FULL WELL."

When Igraine Lim went for a pregnancy scan, she learned her first child, a baby boy, had a lot of fluid in his lungs.

Doctors were unsure why this was the case, and it was too early to detect what underlying conditions might be responsible.

Igraine had multiple procedures to drain the fluid in utero, while she and her husband Josh wondered if he would survive.

"I would have loved to be able to talk to some people who've had that experience," Igraine later told Eternity news. "It felt quite daunting at that moment."

At four weeks, Josiah Lim was diagnosed with PACS1 syndrome, a rare syndrome that affects intellectual development, mobility and speech, and can also cause regular seizures and sleep issues.

At six weeks, after heart surgery, Josiah could go home. "I was just so overjoyed that he was home and alive," Igraine remembers.

But as time went on, Josh and Igraine felt alone on their journey. They looked for a Christian support group for families living with disability and were surprised not to find anything.

Igraine was eventually encouraged to start a group herself and was put in touch with Matt and Erica Dodd, a young family also living with disability, through mutual friends.


Matt and Erica's son Noah was the same age as Josiah and had been diagnosed with Down Syndrome.

When Igraine reached out to Erica with the idea of starting a support network for Christian families living with disability, Erica said to her: "You wouldn't believe this, I've been praying for six months for this group to start!"

has gone through a similar experience," Erica told Sydney Anglicans magazine.

"God in his kindness surrounded us with people who had a similar journey."

In 2019, the 139 Collective was born and by September 2020, it already had more than 140 members encouraging and praying for one another and wrestling with tough questions.

In September 2020, Erica and Igraine were also granted \$5,000 as part of ADM's Annual Funding Event to build a website to publish resources available to churches and others. The website went live in May 2021 and by mid July 2021, the 139 Collective group had more than 300 members.

Engaging our world with the gospel



Annual Public Lecture

Dr Katy Davis delivered the fifth ADM Annual Public Lecture on 'Desire, Fear, and Being Human'.

The ADM Annual Public Lecture continued in 2020 – thanks to livestream! – to provide a platform for a Christian woman to engage our world with the good news of Jesus and inspire Christians with imaginative ways to make the gospel intelligible in their own spheres.

Lecture excerpt

What gets us up in the morning is not the decisions we make, our thoughts or our emotions. It's the momentum of desire that moves us and shapes what we believe, choose and feel, whether we are conscious of the desire or not.

Listening to our internal monologue reveals the strength of our desires and fears that shape our experience of the world. Internally, we hold questions that are very rarely spoken aloud,

"Will I ever be free of the drive of a particular desire? Will I ever be free of the bind that fear has on me?"

"How long can I keep hoping? Or would it be easier to shut down my desire so that I can just live, so that I can accept and move on?

"Am I created to desire? Or is my desire part of what is broken about this world?" At the core of these questions are some questions that are more fundamental:

Is this part of how life is to be? Is this part of who I am? Is desiring and fearing part of what it means to be human?

My contention in this lecture is that the Christian worldview, shaped by the Bible, offers a viewpoint that could deeply transform our understanding of our desires, our fears and of being human.

Why do I contend that the Christian worldview, which we are invited to consider through the biblical story, offers a transformative understanding of desire, fear, and being human?

Here is the reason; because the Christian worldview offers a circuit-breaker to the futile circle of unmet desire and offers rest for our longings.



Our 2020 Lecturer Dr Katy Davis

Katy is a leading Old Testament scholar currently writing a commentary on Exodus for Zondervan. In 2020, she was Principal of Mary Andrews College and prior to that lecturer in Old Testament and Director of Postgraduate Studies at Bible College of South Australia. Katy completed her PhD through Trinity College at the University of Bristol on 'The Persuasive Intent of the Book of Leviticus'.



The Christian worldview upholds that for those who look to the Son – and seek the peaceful completeness in relationship with him, the relationship we as humans were created for – there is rest for our unmet desires. There is rest from longing for an imagined life that remains beyond our grasp. There is rest from the inner tension between the drive of our desires and the fear that holds us back

We find rest for our unmet desires because we no longer

expect anything we have created or anyone else other than Jesus to bring the satisfaction that only relationship with God can bring; peaceful completeness, in connection with him and one another.

We find rest because the certainty of life beyond the grave – for those of us who look to the Son – surpasses any future or any life we can imagine for ourselves.





The challenge: do we view all people as providers of grace and love to our churches? Or do we see those with disabilities as problems to be solved? The first attitude is light and life to those living with a disability, their families and a watching world."

"I am so thankful that I had the opportunity to hear such wonderful speakers – who have each done so many years of research, thinking, writing and 'lived' these things out in their lives. Each of these talks have inspired my thinking in how to reach more people with the hope of Jesus."

"Brian Brock explored his son Adam's life experiences with our masterclass, sharing the different realities faced by Adam and by those who interact with him.

We were prompted to reflect on our own responses to differently abled people and examine our attitudes as to what true inclusion looks like, particularly in a church context. While we may assume the Church welcomes disabled people more universally than society, this perception can be out of step with the reality experienced by those who come to church with a disability and feel a relative barrier before them.

To truly welcome all people we must have a pervasive theology of Christ's body, that is, the Church, as a community that we are not only sanctified into but also sanctified through. People with disabilities play a key role in this reality. Almost all of us will experience disability at some time in our lives, so to have a full understanding of the gospel being good news for us as a community of weak vulnerable people will lead us towards the ministry of Christ."

DEACONESS STORY

Olive's Story

When Olive Cotter's family emigrated from an English village to Sydney's North Shore, the move set in motion a series of changes that would eventually bring Olive to a life of Christian service as a deaconess, parish worker, missionary and chaplain.

Olive recalls that school scripture and church events reinforced her understanding that "Before I knew him, he loved me."

In 1955, after becoming a Christian just four years earlier at a church house party in Rathane, Olive heard a missionary nurse share her experiences of serving the Lord in Malaysia. Reflecting on what she had heard, Olive began to wonder, ask, and pray about whether she too could serve in similar ways.

She began to notice Bible verses such as those in Isaiah "Who will go for us?" and "Whom shall we send?" After spending a year wrestling with questions, seeking godly advice and praying for direction, Olive applied to the Church Missionary Society (CMS) and was accepted as a candidate to begin studies at Deaconess House in 1957.

She served at churches in Erskineville, Padstow, Figtree and Coolah, learning "... how brilliant it was for me" before receiving news from CMS, stating "You're going to Kenya". In 1961 Olive went to Kenya where she met Harry, who was teaching with Scripture Union (SU).

Two years later they married and together worked with CMS & SU in Kenya. Living in Nairobi, they began their family of four children before returning to Sydney in 1974.

Ordained as a deaconess in 1982, Olive worked in parish and as a chaplain, including at the former ADM hospital, Neringah.

Olive and Harry continued their various ministries at Barker College and praying for and supporting TEAR, SU and CMS. They also went to serve the Lord Jesus in Singapore 1988-90 OMF/SU and again in Kenya from 1998 to 2002, before returning to Australia.

Harry's death was a sad blow to Olive, but she is grateful for the time they had to share and prepare and is confident of God's faithfulness and that no tears are wasted (Psalm 56:8). Olive reflects that Harry is "more alive than ever."

Olive is truly a joyful woman, living out her creed "I just do what I can for Jesus."

Olive says she wants to be remembered for sharing God's everlasting love.

"I'm just one of his spoilt children and I want other people to know him too."

The women who study at MAC range in ages from 19 to 80, with some who have multiple degrees in different fields, and others who did not complete high school. Each of our students share the desire to become more Christlike and to serve his Church and his people. They come to MAC in order to study and grow together in community.

Some women come to MAC in order to be trained for roles in pastoral care or community chaplaincy. You can read stories of some of our students who

have done just that on pages 44-45 of this annual report. Others come to study at MAC to be better equipped to do the ministry roles they are already involved in, whether that's running Bible study groups, teaching SRE, or serving on the pastoral care team of their local church.

MAC is a community of like-minded women who understand the challenges of juggling study with family, ministry and other responsibilities. At MAC, we make study as flexible as possible for our students, which means many of our students study as little as one subject per semester. As students follow a range of study pathways that reflect their needs and goals, we work at developing and fostering a sense of community and connection for everyone who studies at MAC.

In order to keep making our study options as flexible and accessible as possible, MAC is looking to develop a range of short courses in our areas of expertise – discipleship, ministry skills, pastoral care, mental health, and disability – that can run through a hybrid model on campus as well as in churches throughout Sydney and beyond. We'd love to see women in churches across Australia better equipped to handle the word of God faithfully and to activate them for gospel ministry.

Hybrid learning

Amidst the challenges of COVID-19, MAC has had the opportunity to begin offering online classes for the first time. With the introduction of a hybrid teaching model, students in the classroom and students online join together for live lectures.

Through this teaching model, online students now have the same real-time access to their lecturers and class discussions as face-to-face students.

In combination with our expanding digital library collection, this hybrid approach to learning is opening up many new opportunities for women across the country. The hybrid model now gives MAC the capacity to make our teaching available to women across Australia, particularly to those in regional and remote areas for whom theological education is often less accessible. This is an exciting opportunity for MAC to be able to see more women grow in their knowledge and understanding of God's word and continue to be spiritually transformed to become more like Christ.



Formation groups

At MAC, spiritual formation happens both formally in the classroom but also informally as students meet together with MAC staff and their peers. Our formation groups give students the opportunity to meet together each week, to pray and encourage one another while working through a selected text. In semester 1 2021. MAC lecturer Jill Williams facilitated our formation groups working through John Mark Comer's The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry: How to Stay Emotionally Healthy and Spirituality Alive in the Chaos of the Modern World.

Annette is currently studying for a Diploma of Theology

While Annette is a qualified physiotherapist, it had been a long time since she had done any tertiary study. With some trepidation, Annette enrolled in the Diploma of Theology at MAC at the beginning of 2021.

Before commencing, Annette participated in MAC's two day Return to Learn program, which helps students prepare for study at MAC. The program focuses on study skills, time management and preparing students for theological study. Meeting other women like herself who were also feeling a little nervous about returning to study, as well as learning a range of study skills, helped Annette feel better prepared to begin her study at MAC.

Annette's first semester at MAC, however, didn't quite go to plan. While participating in a Bike for Bibles fundraising event, Annette fell off her bike and broke her arm. Annette said she was "incredibly worried that I wasn't going to be able to complete my study that semester because I could not type or write and I was getting tired much more easily." Annette

recalls her surprise at the pastoral and practical support she was offered by MAC staff, saying that "I was able to get extensions on my assignments, and submit some of them by recording my voice rather than having to type them out."

While her first semester didn't work out quite the way she had planned, it gave her first-hand experience of the level of support MAC provides to students in challenging circumstances.

Annette reflects that "MAC staff really model the pastoral care they teach, which makes it a wonderful place to be able to study God's Word with likeminded women."

Victoria's Story

Victoria studied for a Diploma of Theology

After 12 months offering pastoral care as a volunteer, and with her Diploma of Theology from Mary Andrews College almost completed, Victoria has accepted a role as a pastoral carer at Dudley Foord House Aged Care Facility at The Ponds in North-West Sydney.

Victoria's studies at Mary Andrews College helped her grow in her theological knowledge, which in turn built her confidence in answering questions from the residents. The practical skills she developed in pastoral care units have also equipped her to care for residents with diminished cognitive abilities and those who are nearing end-of-life.

Nicole's Story

Nicole graduated in 2021 with a Diploma of Theology

Five years ago, while working as the office administrator at her church, Nicole received an email about the Ministry with Seniors unit being run at MAC. As she was already involved in this area of ministry, the unit piqued her interest and she enrolled in a Diploma of Theology.

Around the same time, she asked the chaplain at her local retirement village if she could join him as a student minister, combining her study with handson ministry experience. The Chaplain and Chapel Committee readily agreed and Nicole started work.

Nicole was now serving in a ministry she loved and being stretched and challenged in her study, developing new skills and a deeper knowledge of God's Word. She says her husband has described this season of her life as 'her time to flourish'. And flourishing, she is.

Initially Nicole's interested was specifically in pastoral care, yet the Diploma of Theology gave her the opportunity to study a range of theology and ministry





topics. "I had no idea how wonderful it would be to also study Biblical Theology, Church History and Christian Thought. Each unit has become my 'favourite subject' as it has opened up my understanding and love for God and his Word."

Upon completion of her Diploma, Nicole was offered the role of assistant chaplain at the retirement village where she had been volunteering.

Nicole says it has been a great privilege to walk alongside the saints at the retirement village, as they have continued to trust God and proclaim his goodness even amid tremendous challenges with their health and families.

Supporting wellbeing and mental health

Graduate Certificate of Pastoral Care for Mental Health

COVID-19 has put mental health on everyone's agenda. But mental health needs had been a significant concern in our communities and churches well before the pandemic made mental health a matter of everyday conversation.

In 2019, staff at ADM and Mary Andrews College began to consider how to deepen understanding around mental health in our churches from a robust theological perspective.

In late 2020, MAC gained approval to teach a new Australian College of Theology offering, the Graduate Certificate of Pastoral Care for Mental Health.

The need for church leaders and members to be better equipped to address mental ill-health was highlighted in a research study commissioned by the Mental Health & Pastoral Care Institute and conducted by McCrindle Research. In this study, ministry workers reported feeling underequipped to care effectively for those experiencing mental health challenges.

Christians working in health care, particularly those working in the area of mental health, are also seeking further training to gain a theological framework for their work. There are also Christians working in school settings who have pastoral care and wellbeing responsibilities who are looking for opportunities to reflect upon these matters from a theological perspective.

The new Graduate Certificate offers a biblical and theological foundation to inform wise pastoral responses to matters of mental health. The certificate highlights the importance of Christians seeking assistance from mental health professionals and the medical and psychological expertise they offer, as well as the unique benefits that flow from the gospel of grace and from connection with Christian communities.

The course focuses on the positive elements of mental health and wellbeing as well as mental ill-health. It is particularly designed for ministry staff, for Christian mental health

professionals wanting a deeper theological perspective on their work, for Christians working in schools with pastoral and wellbeing responsibilities, and for anyone seeking to grow in their understanding in this area. While Mary Andrews College focuses on training Christian women, this Graduate Certificate welcomes both women and men.
